THE push to bring back Melbourne's tram conductors is about to hit the big screen. A stirring documentary arguing the case for the city's much-loved "connies" will premiere this weekend at the Melbourne International Film Festival.

Launching in the midst of the city's \$3 billion myki debacle, Bring'Em Back! is poised to revive debate for the return of the human touch to public transport. Director Phillip Donnellon urged the State Government to embrace the idea of a multi-pronged system. "I don't want to be antimyki.... but I think if we had conductors on the tourist routes and aboard W-class trams ... then it would actually help," Donnellon said.

The last conductors were removed from trams in 1998 after a long and bitter battle. Supporters argue that conductors didn't just sell tickets - they improved safety, were tourist guides, helped the elderly and disabled, and offered companionship and even counseling.
